Fr Allan's words

“Where are you now, West Calder or Livingston?”

A question asked of me last week as I attended Fr. Mike Regan's Silver Jubilee of Ordination. The person asking had been a parishioner of mine twenty three years ago when I was an assistant priest in St. Kentigern's Edinburgh, coincidentally where Fr. Mike is now parish priest.



In the course of our conversation when we relived memories from the past, the comment was made that the group of priests present that night to honour Fr. Mike seemed to be a very happy bunch and seemed to be enjoying one another's company. Indeed we did and in fact do enjoy each other's company, something I suppose I took for granted, until it was highlighted in that conversation.

I write this as the Church prepares this weekend to celebrate Good Shepherd Sunday, traditionally the time we are asked to pray for Vocations to the Priesthood and Religious Life.

In 2005, I celebrated my own Silver Jubilee, last year Fr. Mike Purcell celebrated his, and last week Fr. Mike Regan his. Adding up the numbers gives over seventy five years of service in the priesthood to the Diocese, not an insignificant amount of time.

More importantly, it is seventy five years in friendship, and shared experience, in a very unique way, in service to the Church.

Without the shadow of doubt, and in spite of some wobbly moments, I would do it all again. It is simply a marvellous way of life, and indeed an immensely privileged one. Marvellous, because of the unique and sustaining bond of friendship that exists among the clergy, particularly in this deanery. Privileged, because of the people we are ordained and sent to serve in the parishes throughout the Archdiocese. It is in this life of service that you welcome us into your families, and invite us to share with you the highs and the lows in living out our faith.

Wherever I have served, including the prisons, it has been my experience that, without doubt, it is a tremendous gift: the call to Priesthood, the gift of Ordination, the opportunity to lead people toward a better understanding of the mystery of God.

I therefore thank all who, over twenty seven years, have sustained, helped and encouraged me in my vocation. I owe you, after my family, a great debt of gratitude, and of course I am grateful for my priest

friends and colleagues.

It is a wonderful gift, and I would encourage any single man who may feel that invitation from God to be bold and courageous, and respond in faith. You won't be disappointed and you will be immensely fulfilled.

In response to the Cardinal's document 'Together in Hope' Graeme Sharkey and myself together with Fr. Loreto attended a St. David's Deanery wide training course held at St. Martin's, Tranent on 15 September 2004 keeping in mind the Cardinal's 5 principles :-

- A spirit of prayer being at the heart of our thinking and planning.
- Conversion of heart.
- Collaboration at every level of Church life being essential to the future of the Church.
- Planning as a way of developing life in the diocese.
- Witnessing in the world to Jesus Christ.

At the first ever meeting of St. David's Parish Pastoral Council on 8th November 2004 the Council began its work: Chair Brian Nimmo; Vice Chair Leo de Haan; Note Taker Graeme Sharkey.

Under the guidance of Fr. Loreto meetings were held to discuss various issues in January, June and July of 2005 and subsequently from September 2005 onwards with Fr. Allan.

While initially concerned with matters of a pastoral nature, i.e. 'setting the parish on fire with faith', the Council has seen its remit under Fr. Allan take on a broader perspective particularly in view of Father's responsibility for two parishes and a prison.

Any member of the above group can be contacted to discuss any parish issue while all meetings are 'Open' to the Parish to attend (held in the Hall) and you will be most welcome. Our express aim is to support Father and the Parish in any way we can.

The most recent meeting was held on 23rd April 2007, the agenda was wide ranging and included the next issue of this Parish Magazine.

News from the Schools



St. David's High School

St. David's High School has had a very lively start to 2007 in all areas of school life.

Our radio station - Radio Boom Box - has had 2 broadcasts, featuring pupils, staff and guests from the community. Pupils involved have developed skills in researching, scripting and broadcasting and have thoroughly enjoyed the experience. After Easter, we hope to involve our associated primaries in future radio broadcasts. We would also welcome news from our Deanery parishes.

In February, 25 senior students visited Barcelona as part of their study programmes in Art and Modern Languages. They had a very enjoyable and valuable trip and staff were impressed by their behaviour.

We celebrated Ash Wednesday with 3 House Liturgies, led by Father Chambers and our Lay Chaplain, Iris Lawrie. During Lent, St. David's will continue to support the Association of People with Disabilities in Bangalore through our WOW Project. This project involves the whole school community and assists the work of SCIAF across the world. We hope to add to our Lenten Challenge on St. Patrick's Day, when we will be having a range of musical and sporting events in support of Bangalore.

St. David's was honoured on March 1 to host a visit from Jean Vanier, who was taking part in the International Festival of Middle Eastern Spirituality and Peace in Edinburgh. It was a very moving and memorable occasion, which involved our senior students and seniors from several other Scottish schools. We were also joined by Cardinal O'Brien and Sir Tom Farmer, who have been great supporters of our colleagues in Bangalore. The visit ended with a live video link with India during which Jean Vanier shared his thoughts and inspirational work with the association. The whole event was a major highlight in

the school year.

Our pupils are now in the final stages of preparation for their exams in May. I know you will wish them success.

St. David's Primary School

FIRST Minister Jack McConnell visited St David's Primary School in March to launch his strategy for dealing with an ageing population by meeting the Dalkeith school's 73-year-old basketball coach, Bea Mason.

Mr McConnell and Minister for Communities Rhona Brankin spent time watching Ms Mason, who retired nine years ago, as she coached youngsters in the school hall. They also met members of the advisory group who helped to draw up the plan, including David Manion, chief executive of Age Concern, as well as older people who have taken up various forms of volunteering.

Mr McConnell said the aim was to improve older people's quality of life and create opportunities for youngsters to benefit from the experience of their elders. He said: "We need to ensure that people can live life to the full as they grow older."

Principal Teacher Tony Currie said: "Bea is still sharing her talents with the local community with which she is still very much involved."

The school's Pupil Council, which consists of one representative from each P4 to P7 class, showed the First Minister every school display during his visit and explained to him the many initiatives and developments the school has ongoing in order to maintain the high standards the school expects from its pupils.

The school's Head Teacher, Mrs Ann Marie Hepburn commented: "We are delighted to welcome Scotland's most senior Minister to St. David's Primary School. We are very proud of our school. The children and staff work extremely hard to maintain the high standards expected of them."

Society of the Sacred Heart

The Sisters of the Sacred Heart came to Dalkeith in 1975 when a small local community of four Sisters took up residence in "Westwood House", Newbattle Road. This was a second off-shoot from the Community at Craiglockhart College of Education, Edinburgh, the first having been a small foundation in Gilmerton, our neighbouring parish, two or three years before. A third small inserted community



was established in Ballingry, Fife.

The aftermath of the second Vatican Council [Oct 11, 1962 - Dec 8, 1965] witnessed considerable change in the Church and in the Religious Orders of apostolic life. This happened gradually over a period of time. The large institutional religious houses were no longer deemed necessary nor the best thing in a rapidly changing world. As religious reached the stage of first retirement, smaller inserted communities of three to five sisters were established, usually in parishes where specific needs were identified that, according to the charism of the Order, the sisters could help meet. I am sure many in the parish will still remember the late Sister Veronica Blount, who on retiring as Principal of the College of Education, identified Dalkeith as a parish where there would be scope for on-going apostolic work. "Westwood Community" was born with Sister Sadie and Sister Teresa Deasy as the advance guard to be joined a little later by Sister Veronica and then Sister Nora Smyth who was not retired and who went out daily to teach in Mayfield. At that time, over thirty years ago, the Sisters, were still quite active and able to engage in catechetical work and prayer groups, in regular radio-broadcasting and in parish visitation. Various sisters came and went over the years.

Meanwhile, State intervention radically changed the system of catholic teacher training, eventually closing our colleges, and lean years as to vocations gradually changed what had once been certain in the Church. Sisters were getting older and more frail. With no young ones coming into the communities, it was foreseen that there would be no-one to look after the elderly and infirm and that a Care Home would be necessary.

To this purpose, "Rosehill", at 27 Park Road and adjacent to the Parish Church, was acquired in 1985. Since then, the building has gradually been extended, to a capacity sufficient to accommodate the elderly and infirm from our Aberdeen, Perth and Edinburgh Communities as need arises, giving them a caring environment within the ethos of religious life. The Westwood community was transferred to Rosehill in 1988.

Rosehill currently houses thirteen Sisters in the septogenarian, octogenarian and nonogenarian age brackets. Because most are no longer physically able to continue in active parish work, the main apostolate of the house is prayer and we are delighted when members of the parish ask us to pray for them or their families. One sister helps regularly with the project for the homeless run by the Sisters of Mercy at Lauriston. Some are still able to help with parish ministries, as readers and extraordinary ministers of the Eucharist and taking communion to the housebound. Some still do a little parish visitation. We like to be part of the parish's senior citizen group when there are activities for them or to invite the older parishioners to come along when the Care Staff organize some entertainment in the care wing of the convent. One recent innovation, about which everyone is happy, is the weekly parish Mass held in our oratory on Tuesdays followed by a "cuppa" for those who wish. The Mass is a real meeting point. St. David's Brass Band - 25 years old

St. David's High School Brass Band was formed 25 years ago by brass teacher John A Dickson, primarily with pupils from St. David's High and its feeder primaries, with encouragement from Head Teacher Thomas O'Malley and the Music Department at St. David's High School. Playing at many school concerts gave the players a taste of performing in an ensemble and a musical social life. The Band has played at many events throughout the years, including for the Princess Royal in Holyrood Park, and a broadcast on BBC Radio Scotland.

Band Players have also triumphed in Solo and Quartet contests over the years and have held the East of Scotland titles on many occasions. In 1986 the Band first appeared on the contest stage, winning the Scottish Youth title. It subsequently had the honour of playing in the Royal Albert Hall representing Scotland.

As players reached the end of their school careers, many wished to carry on playing and so St. David's Brass Band was formed. Starting from humble

beginnings the Band's stature grew and in 1998 it won the Scottish 4th Section Brass Band title, beating many adult Bands in the process. Playing at the National Finals in Harrogate later that year the Band was placed 6th. The same year also saw the award of Lottery funding, allowing the purchase of a complete set of instruments to replace the original ones, some of which were older than the grandparents of the children playing them.

A tour of Germany followed in 1999 with the Midlothian Twinning Association. The Band performed a number of concerts, including broadcasts on both Dutch and German Radio. Contest successes followed for the Band and its individual players in various competitions, including victory in the East Of Scotland Quartet competition, with awards for Band and player alike. In 2004, the Band's biggest success to date was to be crowned Scottish 3rd Section Champions with subsequent promotion to the 2nd Section.

Concerts take place regularly in the Dalkeith and Edinburgh area, with a Christmas concert rotating between the Churches in the town, all proceeds being donated to Friends of Midlothian's Children. The Band also plays at the Dalkeith Festival and other Gala events in Midlothian. All money raised is re-invested, helping to purchase new music and maintain the equipment.

The community band supports the High School Band and the Midlothian Schools Brass Band with music and instruments for the pupils to use.

There are many people Band members wish to thank for support over the years, too numerous to mention. Foremost is John Dickson, without whom none of this would be possible. We are very grateful too, for the many years support and encouragement given to us by the late Canon Liam Healy, especially in our 'homeless' days. Thanks also to the Parish Priests who followed him, not forgetting the Parish Community of St. David's who have supported, not only our concerts, but also our fundraising efforts for our long distance ventures, always with great enthusiasm. Gift Aid

Thank you to all who take the time to use the scheme. This is a valuable source of income which only costs the time of filling in a form and using an envelope.

For the tax year 2006/7, our reclaim from the Government will be £5,000 which is an increase of 80% on previous years. All envelopes for current members for 2007/2008 have now been sent out. If any other taxpayers would like to join the Scheme, there are forms at the back of the Church in the Gift Aid box which can be filled in and left in the box.

As an example - if you redirect a contribution of say £1.50 a week and you register for Gift Aid, the church can claim £110 back over the next 5 years from the Government purely for the fact you use an envelope.

## St. David's H.S. Chapel & Chaplaincy

The pupils and staff of St. David's High are rightly proud of their small chapel and chaplaincy base. Having this facility is certainly a bonus and the envy of other schools.

The chapel can seat approximately fifty people. The altar was gifted to the school by the Passionist Fathers when St. Joseph's school and chapel in Tranent closed down.

There is a lovely painting hanging on the wall which was painted by a former Deputy Head teacher, Mr. Felix McCullough. Posters of Stations of the Cross hang on two of the walls. There is a keyboard in place at the back of the chapel which is invaluable for the various services which take place there. The sanctuary lamps are former miners lamps.

The pride and joy in the chapel are the two stained glass windows. The windows were designed by pupils in the school, and depict the life and work of the local community.

Our Blessed Lady and St. David are featured in one of the windows.



Agriculture, mining, fishing, engineering and Newbattle Abbey are also encompassed in these

beautiful windows.

The windows were created and painted by two Edinburgh artists, Ann Sinclair and John.



The money for the windows was raised through various fund raising events, which people from our parish generously contributed to, but the bulk of the money was donated by HBG who built the school building. The full beauty of the windows can be seen when the sun shines and the colours are shown brightly on the chapel walls.

The chapel was consecrated by Cardinal O'Brien. The chapel is widely used. Mass is celebrated every Tuesday lunchtime. During Lent, services of Stations of the Cross are held. The Rosary is recited in the chapel during May and October, whenever possible. Prayer meetings, etc. are held regularly. Staff and pupils also come to the chapel for private prayer.

The chaplaincy is a wonderful resource for pupils and staff. Chaplaincy staff man the room for most of the week. Groups of pupils meet in the chaplaincy for prayer and discussion. Pupils and staff also meet with chaplaincy staff on one-to-one meetings. At morning break and lunchtime the room is utilised by pupils as a drop-in base, and it can become quite crowded and sometimes noisy. Meetings between the Deanery Clergy and the core chaplaincy group take place several times a year in the chaplaincy. The chaplaincy core group arranged a very successful pilgrimage to Carfin during the first school term, and it is hoped to take another first year group to Nunraw during the summer term. Subject departments are invited to the chaplaincy for coffee and cakes on a rotational basis. The room has had many distinguished visitors including the Cardinal and the First Minister. There is always a warm welcome to everyone from the least of us to the greatest.

The St. David's R.C. High School Chaplaincy endeavours to build a community based on gospel values and to facilitate religious practice, and is witness to a faith presence in the school.

## **Altar Serving**

When I moved back into the Parish in 1986, Fr. Gardiner, St. David's assistant to Canon Mohan asked me if I would get involved, take charge, and tutor the altar boys (no girls then). A daunting task for me then, as I was a raw recruit also. After some thought I accepted the position, and looking back now over the years I have certainly enjoyed the involvement, not just on the altar, but getting more insight backstage in the Sacristy!!

Over the years countless children and some adults have served in St. David's. What pleases me is watching the very young starting fresh, nursing them along and still see them serving for many years to come.

Outings to Drygrange, or indoor bowling, even a trip with Fr. Healy to Parkhead were great days out for the children. Fr. Gardiner used to encourage all children to serve. At one point I was looking after more than 30 children. In those days we had 2 or more priests, so the servers had to go on a rota. Christmas was hectic, as all the children wanted to serve Midnight Mass. Could be very cramped up there on the altar.

Two special boys, Alec & Sandie from the Faith & Light Group also served, but with their own handicaps, they ended up wanting to ring the bells all through Mass. On another occasion the thurible burst into flames because of the candle wax. Couldn't see Canon Mohan for the smoke!!

When Fr Healy came to St. David's he introduced different coloured albs for the servers to wear, white, purple & green. A picture of Killarney Football Team adorned the back wall in the Sacristy and all the servers had to bow to the team or else they would not serve!! Canon Healy even told the kids he played in that team and could they pick him out? Some did!! Canon Healy at first didn't want girls on the Altar, but after visiting the Primary, he was overwhelmed with the response for new altar servers.



Mostly girls came along, and St. David's has never looked back.

For every new priest the altar servers have adapted to their ways. The children on the altar are a great credit to their parents, grandparents, families and teachers. St. David's has a great bunch of servers who are loyal, dedicated, do their duties with respect and enthusiasm, and still have smiles and happy faces. I am sure this reflects on the congregation along with our P.P. Fr. Chambers. We are always looking for a new child to come along and serve, you never know where it will lead. (Ian Clarke)

### **Antonella, Marchioness of Lothian - Obituary**

ANTONELLA LOTHIAN, universally known as Tony, combined the resilience and humour of her father's Yorkshire roots with the warmth, vitality and style of her Italian mother, but she found her greatest sense of belonging in the Border country of Scotland which was her home for most of her 84 years.

She was born Antonella Reuss Newland in 1922, and spent her childhood both abroad and also in Suffolk where she had moved in 1928 on her mother's remarriage.

It was during those years that her knowledge of country life and people began to grow, as did her abiding love for the sea, both of which remained integral to her happiness and peace of mind throughout her always busy, and often hectic, life.

Tony married Peter, the 12th Marquis of Lothian, in April 1943 at the Brompton Oratory in London.

Born Peter Kerr, he had succeeded his cousin Philip Lothian in 1940 when he was 18. Their Christian belief, deeply strengthened by their shared Catholicism, was the foundation of their life-long commitment to the importance of ecumenicism and Christian unity, and also to their open-minded

understanding and acceptance of faith in all its forms. In 1995 Lady Lothian, together with the distinguished Presbyterian theologian Professor Tom Torrance, founded the Scottish Order of Christian Unity, a specifically ecumenical group dedicated to the encouragement and defence of essential Christian ethics, as applied to everyday life. She actively supported its work, in person and financially, for many years, and her financial support continued even when she was no longer able to play an active personal part.

Rev. Dr Dennis Wood, chairman of the Order's executive committee, said: "We are extremely grateful to her for all that she did on our behalf and feel that we have lost a staunch defender of the Christian faith. It is no small measure due to her that we continue to operate successfully."

Tony was driven by a huge curiosity, energy and courage to connect with all those she met, and also to fight for those people and causes that needed a voice to champion them.

She lived by Burns' maxim, 'A man's a man for a' that', and her column in the Scottish Daily Express from 1960 to 1975, as well as her inspirational founding of the Women of the Year Lunch in 1955, are a testament to her drive, charisma, and genius for finding ways to get people from all walks of life to communicate and become friends.

She made her closest friends from this diverse yet universal group: Valentina Tereshkova, the first Woman in space, Joan Armatrading, and Mikki Doyle, editor of the Morning Star, were some among a multitude of others.

It was the friendships and sense of community that she found in the Borders that were her abiding love and source of comfort, especially after Peter's death in 2004.

She skilfully and lovingly made a family home at Monteviot where her six children enjoyed the happiest of childhoods, but her greatest satisfaction was to restore Ferniehurst Castle to its rightful position as the Kerr family historical stronghold, and to let it once again become an integral part of Jedburgh life.

Nothing gave her more pleasure than taking part in all the great Jethart festival events, the Kirking of the Callant, and the ride out to Ferniehurst on Festival Day.

For her, wherever she lived, Jethart was always here, and her spirit will forever remain in her beloved Border hills.
